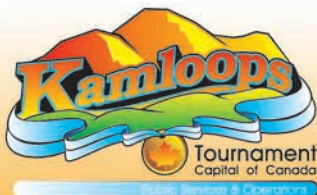

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Tracking the WolfPack

Among the many transitions our university has made since it became Thompson Rivers University last spring, none has been more dramatic than the past season's move up to university sport by our basketball and volleyball teams.

This change of leagues has ushered in a whole new world for our teams: in the 2004/05 season, they were at the top of the Canadian Colleges Athletics Association; our men's basketball team was basking in the glory of winning provincial and national gold medals, while our women's volleyball team was celebrating provincial gold and national bronze wins.

Last spring, at the end of their inaugural 2005/06 season in the Canada West conference of Canadian Interuniversity Sport (CIS), our WolfPack teams stood at the bottom of the rankings, each team having won one or two games at most.

There's certainly no surprise or shame in this; it's a natural progression. And there have been notable highlights. The lead story of the WolfPack's inaugural season in the Canadian Interuniversity Sports league has to be the fact that our women's basketball team is the only team to have defeated SFU in conference play this season. When our women downed the Clan in the WolfPack's home-opener last October, the win was heralded in newspapers across Canada, trumpeted in one as "Thompson Rivers Slays the Giant."

This achievement is particularly noteworthy considering some teams entering CIS for the first time didn't win a game all season. With a start like this, it's safe to predict that we'll have won more than a few national championships by the end of the next decade.

We can expect to host many tournaments of benefit to our university and to our community in the coming years. Like last December's high school volleyball tournament organized by WolfPack men's volleyball head coach Pat Hennelly, secondary-

level tournaments create opportunities for high school students to showcase their athletic prowess in hopes of recruitment to a university team.

As a member of the CIS, TRU will have many opportunities to host varsity playoffs, and will have the facilities to do so. In the very near future, TRU's campus will be the site of world-class athletics facilities as Kamloops' tournament capital project comes to completion.

This project, an initiative of the City of Kamloops on TRU property, will make TRU Athletics the site of one of the premier venues in university sport. TRU greatly appreciates the efforts and commitment shown by the City of Kamloops in bringing this project to fruition. It will be a great incentive to recruits, who will play, study and learn here, and possibly stay to work, raise families, and eventually give back to the community which fostered their educational and athletic success.

After our initial CIS probationary period for basketball and volleyball is over, TRU will also be looking to field teams in other sports. Soccer seems to be a logical choice, since our university already fields men's and women's soccer teams at the college level, but TRU will in the near future need to create a process for adding or withdrawing from sports programs. There will be opportunities in the next decade for other club teams as well. Given the world-class facilities on campus, track and field, swimming, and other field sports seem to be natural choices.

New teams represent a major financial investment, however. Right now, it's a matter of steadily building up our existing teams through recruitment of promising young athletes and retention of existing team members. A strong scholarship program can help with this, and to that end, the TRU Sports Task Force, a group of community members dedicated to fundraising for WolfPack athletics, will expand its numbers and initiatives in the next ten years. The task force will also be crucial to the development of new CIS teams, as they fundraise for uniforms, trip expenses, locker rooms and sports equipment.

World-class facilities will also be integral to new university programs. Right now, TRU offers a sports events management diploma program, geared to produce graduates capable of organizing large-scale tournament capital events.

The future will likely see the formation of some type of institute for sport tourism and physical activity studies at TRU which would combine the educational expertise of a number of TRU professional schools like tourism, education, social work and nursing, along with the Athletics and Recreation division. These schools, in turn, would partner with community agencies to the general benefit of regional residents in the areas of gerontology, community wellness, research, child development and sports initiatives.

All in all, the future looks very bright for TRU Athletics and Recreation. We will continue to foster partnerships like the City of Kamloops tournament capital project, and to promote relationships like the ones we enjoy with the Kamloops Volleyball Association and others, in order to bring the benefits of university sport to both campus and community for many years to come.

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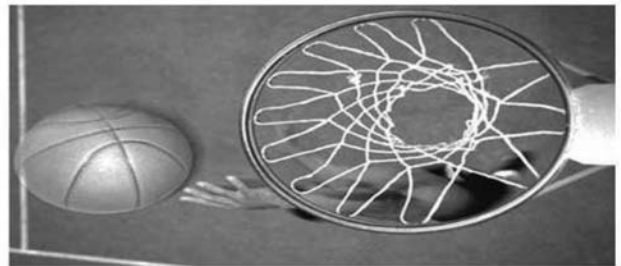

Thompson Rivers University WolfPack Men's Basketball

For a team that swept the Canadian Colleges Athletics Association league in its final year of college ball in its final year in the CCAA, finishing the season with a 27-1 win/loss record and clinching the provincial and national championship gold medals, a 2-18 standing at the end of its first CIS season was disappointing, although the team steadily improved throughout the season, despite numerous mid-season injuries, and lost its final game of the conference season against SFU by only a ten-point spread.

"I thought we had a good start to the year, said head coach Nevin Gleddie. "We had everyone healthy, had some big wins in Ontario and California, and then got blown out in a couple games and started to doubt ourselves to a degree. Overall, however, I was pleased that the guys did not quit on each other and strove to win every single game."

Back on the roster this year are Charlie Spurr, who finished his rookie year ranked third in free-throw percentages in the Canada West conference during

the regular season, and Brian Smith, a 6'5" Academic All-Canadian who was with Gleddie's UCC Sun Demons when they won CCAA national gold in 2005.

Point guard sensation Sean Garvey will be behind the bench this season, as assistant coach to WolfPack men's basketball. Garvey finished his team's inaugural CIS season ranked 5th in assists and 9th in 3-point field goal percentages in conference play in Canada West, was a finalist for BC Sport's College Athlete of the Year, and was named 2005/06 Kamloops Sport Council athlete of the year.

With most of last year's bench graduated or moving on, the WolfPack is looking forward to seven new recruits, including Lucien Sauciuc (Coquitlam), Connor Agnew (Clearwater), Jesse Brown (Vernon), Chris Vanderweide (Ladysmith), Daniel Sawh (Hamilton, ON), Navanga Burke (Hamilton, ON), Kamar Burke (Mississauga, ON), Lee Johnson (Terrace), Shae Doyle (Kamloops), and Tim Unaegbu (Port Coquitlam).

"The WolfPack men's basketball team is small, but relatively athletic, young, but quite skilled, said Gleddie. "If we work as hard as we can and are able to execute as a team we should be in the mix, and with the core of young players we have we will definitely be a contender in the years to come."

Thompson Rivers University WolfPack Women's Basketball

The TRU WolfPack women's basketball team started out its first season in the CIS league with a bang, winning its pre-season home exhibition tournament, then wowing the home fans at its first league game when it ended top-ranked SFU's 45-game winning streak in a surprise 64-58 upset.

The going got a bit rougher after that, with the team ending the season 2-18, but the league season saw TRU remain very competitive, including beating perennial top-ten University of Regina 58-52 at home. The team wasn't mathematically out of the playoffs until the second-last game of the season when it lost to the University of Victoria by only six points.

"The WolfPack hoops women competed every time they were on the floor and that was the most positive feat that came out of this year," said assistant coach Joe Enevoldson, explaining that "2005-06 was a season in which the WolfPack would enter the CIS Pacific Division, which is highly regarded as the toughest division in the toughest conference in the country and have to play the likes of UBC and SFU three times each semester."

The WolfPack was led by leading scorer Kelley O'Grady, who was 12th in the Canada West in scoring, averaging 14.1 ppg, and 3rd in 3-point field goals made. Sarah Cameron, who finished the regular season ranked 3rd in free-throw percentages and 7th in 3-point field goal percentages despite sitting out a couple of months due to injury, proved that she could lead a team at the CIS level as she averaged 8.6 ppg and 3.6 apg. Both are back on the team this year.

This season, newly hired head coach Scott Reeves will have three of last year's starters and most of last year's bench with him to start out the season, as well as four newcomers, one of whom, Kayla Forsyth of Vernon, played for him on the provincial under-16 team. She'll be joined by recruits Jaclyn Cummings of Sault Ste

Marie, an exceptional scholar who was awarded one of seven TRU Ambassador's Entrance Scholarships, Kelsie Baker, an SKSS product who played for Bishop's University last season, Danika Maartman of Westsyde and Mayo Aoki of Langley.

Thompson Rivers University WolfPack Men's Volleyball

Thompson Rivers University WolfPack men's volleyball ended its 2005-06 conference season 1-19, with season highlights including a home opener versus UBC with 800 fans in attendance. A set-stealer versus the U of Calgary Dinos turned out to be the only conference win of the season for the team, but nevertheless, Hennelly was pleased with his team's progress. "Our first CIS season exceeded expectations in the change in play and ability to compete as the season progressed," he said.

The second half of the season was highlighted by strong play against Trinity Western, and taking a set from the University of Manitoba Bisons, ranked fourth in Canada West, in the 'Pack's

final conference match, a great ending to its inaugural CIS season in front of a big home crowd of 500 boisterous fans.

"I am looking forward to increasing our presence in the community and this year's home opener," said head coach Patrick Hennelly. "I feel we moved toward solidifying our program this year with events like our junior and senior tournament and clinics around the city. This has been a great first year for me and the WolfPack men's volleyball program."

Hennelly is looking forward to starting this season with a team that has a balance of new players and young players with a year of CIS experience. He has had a strong recruiting season, and is looking forward to adding nine recruits, two of them, Robin Schoebel (Beausoleil, France) and Martin Korsbak (Fredericia, Denmark), from outside Canada. Hennelly welcomed AAA Provincial High School Championships Most Outstanding Player Kyle Donen, Patrick Johnston of Ontario, Martin Korsbak of Denmark, Matt Harris of Edmonton, Colin and Troy Jaggard of Calgary, Tony Zylstra of Edmonton, and Andy Haley of Stony Plain, Alberta.

Also new to the team this year is Chad Grimm, who joins the coaching staff for the 2006/07 season after playing three seasons of professional volleyball in Denmark and Belgium. Grimm, a former UCC Sun Demon from 1996-1998 where he was a two-time Provincial All-Star and captained his team to its first berth at the National Championships in school history, also played for the UBC Thunderbirds where he was twice named a Canada West All-Star. Most recently, Grimm was head coach of the Middelfart Volleyball Klub in Denmark where he took over a 1-9 club and coached it to a silver medal in the Danish Championships in its first finals appearance in 27 years.

WolfPack women's volleyball head coach Carrie Barrett's challenge was team confidence last season, which ended with a 2-18 for the team record in its inaugural year in the CIS. Since its high point of winning its home-opener vs SFU in October, losing matches was tough for a team that won provincial gold in its last year in the college conference before moving up to CIS play.

The women had some definite highlights in the winter semester, however, taking a set away from the Trinity Western Spartans, ranked #1 in the Canada West conference, in a nailbiter set that saw the teams battle it out to a 30-28 score for the WolfPack. The team also showed its mettle against SFU with a narrow loss in a hard-fought five-set match followed by a win in four sets the next day.

"For our first season in the CIS we were able to meet many of our personal goals in both volleyball and in our academic achievements," said head coach Carrie Barrett.

This year, she's looking forward to a dynamic season. The team is led by three ambitious and focused

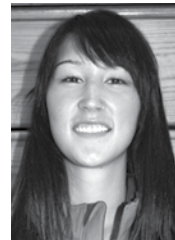
5th-year athletes, Robyn Devlin (Revelstoke), Kristin Peters (Kamloops), and Joy Unaegbu (Port Coquitlam), who are supported by 4th-year returnee Kristy Alblas (Richmond) and 3rd-year returnee Laura Plouffe (Sherwood Park). This group have the drive and ability to continue to work on establishing the expectations of the WolfPack women's volleyball program.

"The foundation of the TRU WolfPack women's volleyball program has been established," Barrett said. "We look forward to its dynamic growth in strength."

Patrick Hennelly—Men's Volleyball



Patrick Hennelly coached the WolfPack's men's volleyball team in its first year of CIS play last season.

Hennelly, who was born in Vancouver and raised in Winlaw, BC, was attracted to TRU by the opportunity to start and nurture a program from the beginning. He holds both Bachelor of Education and Bachelor of Human Kinetics degrees, played Team BC for five years and was a member of the 1989 Canada Games team as a youth. He coached volleyball at UBC between 1995 and 2004. In 2002 he guided the UBC Juniors to the U-20 National Championship. He coached at the University of Northern Arizona the year before he came to TRU.

Patrick brings a lot of CIS, club, and NCAA experience to TRU's program, as well as a broad understanding of the total scope of a successful volleyball program, including community relations, scheduling, fundraising, and recruiting.

Nevin Gleddie—Men's Basketball



Nevin Gleddie has been at TRU for the past 10 years, and last year led his team into its first year of CIS play.

He holds a Master of Science degree in Exercise Physiology and NCCP Level IV theory, technical and practical, and coached the UCC Sun Demons in their last season of CCAA play (2004/05), where his team won provincial and national gold in the 2004/05 season.

He won the CCAA National Coaching Excellence, All Sports, the CCAA Men's Basketball National Coach of the Year, the BCCAA Men's Basketball Provincial Coach of the Year, and Basketball BC College Coaching awards honours in 2004/05 season, and last year was awarded the Kamloops Sports Council Coach of the Year honours.

Scott Reeves—Women's Basketball



Scott Reeves, who holds a Bachelor of Human Kinetics degree from Trinity Western University, a Bachelor of Education degree from UBC and NCCP Level III

certification, comes to the WolfPack with a wide range of coaching experience and an impressive record.

His coaching experience includes work with CIS, high school and club teams. He was assistant coach with the Trinity Western University Spartans in 2003/04 and at Basketball Canada's Center for Performance from 2003 to present, and was head coach for Basketball British Columbia's U16 Girls Provincial Team in 2004 and 2005, and head coach for the Brookwood Senior Secondary School Senior Girls team from 2003 to present.

Reeves has a phenomenal 155-4 record as a head coach, and a 243-31 record as an associate head or assistant at the high school level, making for a 91% win percentage. Reeves' coached teams have won the last three Senior AAA BC Provincial Championships.

Eric Schweizer—Women's Soccer



Eric Schweizer has been involved with soccer at TRU since 1995, when he served as assistant coach to the women's team until 2002, when he assumed the position of head coach. Eric

helped lead the UCC Sun Demons to national silver in 1996, and in 1999 helped the team to BCCAA provincial and CCAA national gold. In 2002, with Eric as head coach, UCC women's soccer won BCCAA provincial gold and CCAA national silver, pulling the same feat off in 2003, when the team again won BCCAA provincial gold and CCAA national silver. A retired high school teacher, Eric also coaches two other city soccer teams on a volunteer basis.

Carrie Barrett—Women's Volleyball



Carrie Barrett is looking forward to heading up the women's volleyball program for a seventh year.

Barrett, who led the WolfPack in its inaugural season in the CIS last year, has coached championship teams at the university, college, provincial and club levels and has been recognized for coaching excellence.

She came to Thompson Rivers University (then the University College of the Cariboo) in the fall of 2000 from the University of Alberta, where she was assistant coach of the team that won national championships two years in a row and head coach of the U-20 provincial champion team. She also holds a bachelor's degree in sport performance from that university, Level III national coaching certification, and is currently working toward NCCP Level 4 certification.

Barrett helped lead the 2002 Team BC to a national silver medal in 2003, was awarded a BCCAA Coaching Excellence Award in 2003 and led her varsity team to provincial bronze in 2004 and a fair play award and provincial gold in 2005.

Sean Wallace, a former UCC Sun Demons athlete and player/coach for the Pacific Coast Soccer League's Kamloops Heat, holds NCCP Level Theory III

Technical III Practical III coaching certification. He served as assistant coach for UCC men's soccer in 1998, and in 1999, when UCC men's soccer won UCC's first CCAA National Gold in the school's history, he was appointed head coach. He was named BCCAA Coach of the Year in the 2001/02 season, and in 2002/03 led his team to a BCCAA Provincial Silver Medal.

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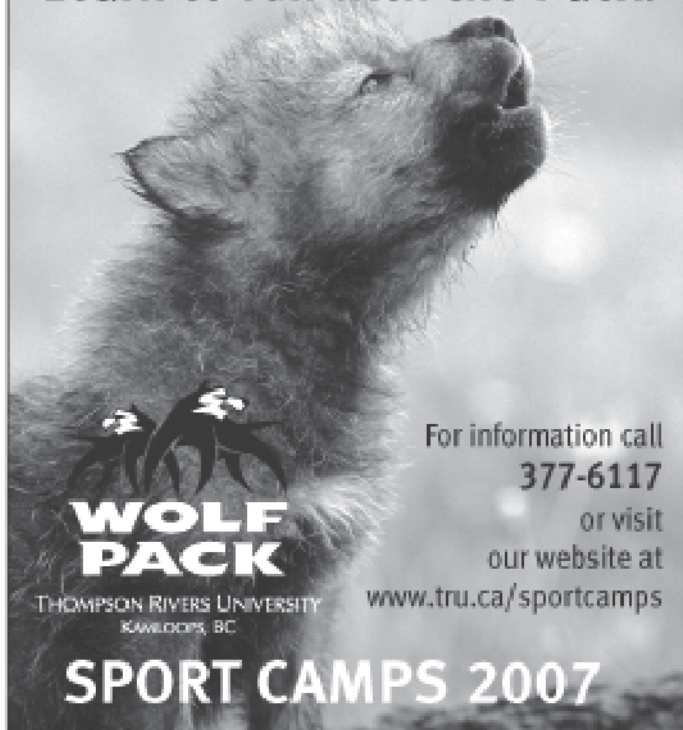
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Where are they now?

Lucas Cockburn— Men's Basketball 1998–2002

TRU grad and scholar-athlete Lucas Cockburn topped all fellow students at medical school, winning seven awards at his convocation from Queen's University this past May.

After graduation from Kamloops Secondary School in 1998, Kamloops-born Cockburn came to Thompson Rivers University on an entrance scholarship. An exemplary scholar and outstanding athlete who played basketball throughout his four years of university study, Cockburn was named Male Athlete of the Year three times before graduation in 2002 with a Bachelor of Science degree, also winning the Governor-General's Silver Medal for achieving the highest marks of all degree graduates.

Entering medical school at Queen's University in Kingston, Ontario, the following year, Cockburn continued to garner awards as a top student, foreshadowing his amazing accomplishments in his final year.

His awards for academic achievement and medical proficiency included the Edgar Forrester Prize and Edgar Forrester Scholarship for achieving the highest standing in medicine in the final year, the Professor's Prize in Surgery for achieving the highest standing in surgical subjects, the W.W. Near and Susan Near Prizes for the highest standing throughout the course, the Hannah Washburn Polson Prize for proficiency in the final year in medicine, surgery and obstetrics, and the Dr. Osler Briggs Dickinson Scholarship for outstanding performance in surgery.

Finally, Cockburn received the award for which his mother is most proud: the Pamela C. Williams Memorial Award for

a graduating medical student who, in addition to good academic standing, demonstrates fellowship, compassion for patients, significant extracurricular achievement and community involvement.

Cockburn, who volunteered at Ponderosa Lodge and with Big Brothers & Sisters while at TRU, was involved with coaching youth basketball through the Boys and Girls club while also keeping up with the arduous study schedule of a medical student at Queen's.

He is currently completing a family practice residency at Toronto Western Hospital, after which he plans to do a year of emergency medicine training and begin work in ER and family practice. After that, for the first time in more than eight years, the young doctor's options are open.

"I am not sure yet where I plan to go, but returning to BC is definitely an attractive option," he said.



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Chad Grimm—Men's Volleyball 1996–1998

The WolfPack Men's Volleyball Team is lucky to have a new face joining the coaching staff for the 2006/07 season with the addition of the experienced Chad Grimm. The Quesnel, BC native is joining the 'Pack from Denmark where he played three seasons of professional volleyball for squads in Denmark and Belgium.

Grimm was a former UCC Sun Demon from 1996-1998 where he was a two-time Provincial All-Star. He also captained his UCC team to its first berth at the National Championships in school history. Chad then went on to play for the UBC Thunderbirds and was a two-time Canada West All-Star.

Most recently, Grimm was the Head Coach of the Middelfart Volleyball Klub in Denmark where he took over a 1-9 club and coached it to a silver medal in the Danish Championships in its first finals appearance in 27 years. This wealth of knowledge, experience and skill will be a vital asset to the WolfPack this year.

"I coached Chad during Team BC and at UBC, so it is nice to know that he is

familiar with my style," said WolfPack men's volleyball head coach Patrick Hennelly. "We are on the same page when it comes to skill development but Chad brings a different approach and personality.

"It is a huge benefit to the program to have someone with Chad's experience both in coaching and playing. Chad will make an immediate impact on the program and of all the additions to the team Chad is probably the most valuable," noted Hennelly.

Reid Brodie—Women's Volleyball 2001–2002

Former Kamloops' resident Reid Brodie hasn't slowed down her pace in the slightest.

Volleyball Prospects Canada recently announced that Reid Brodie will be joining the Class of 2007 Canada Prospects Team as head coach. Currently she is working as the Sport Camps Coordinator at the University of Calgary.

Brodie, a two time former Canadian Women's National B Team member in 2003 and 2004, is a former UCC student and volleyball team member. Brodie graduated from the University of Calgary where she received a

degree in Linguistics. She has applied to grad schools for speech pathology (she speaks four languages fluently).

She was a member on the UofC women's team from 2002-2005 while capturing a national CIS championship in 2004.

Brodie a 6' 2" middle blocker was also a National Championship all star in 2005 when her team finished 3rd at nationals.

In 2003, she was a member of the Canadian National FISU Volleyball Team which participated in Universiade Games in Daegu, Korea.

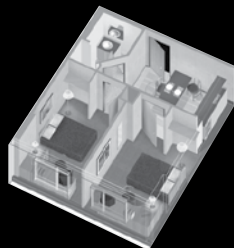


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Backing the 'Pack

Behind TRU's successful varsity program stands a supportive and giving group: The TRU Sports Task Force. The outstanding success that our athletics teams have enjoyed over the years is due in large part to the time, skills and energy that these community supporters have given to our student athletes.

The Task Force's primary objective is to encourage BC students to pursue their post-secondary education and athletic performance closer to home, specifically at Thompson Rivers University, and to make all BC post-secondary students aware of the option of university in Kamloops.

Now entering its 27th year, the Task Force, made up of Kamloops business and community members, has raised over \$1 million for financial and scholarship support for student athletes and the sports program at TRU, and now annually donates up to \$60,000 per year in scholarships.

The Task Force fundraises in a number of ways, with its main activities centred on the annual athletic scholarship campaign at the first of the year, with the awards in

April, the Annual Gala Dinner in the fall and the Annual Golf Tournament held the first Friday in June.

Another fundraising initiative is the TRU WolfPack "Adopt-an-Athlete" program. The program is designed to encourage financial, social and spectator support of WolfPack teams and athletes. The funds provide travel, game-day meals, equipment or other competition-related benefits for varsity athletes. Individuals, businesses, alumni and fans may make a tax-deductible contribution to this program in any amount. For information on Adopt-an-Athlete, or to donate, call 828.6118.

For the first time this year, the WolfPack men's basketball team held a scooter raffle to help with extra expenses associated with exhibition travel, scholarships and equipment. Grand prize was a black 2006 Vespa LX50 Scooter valued at \$5000, while runner-up prizes include WolfPack golf shirts and hats. The team will be holding another raffle this season. Tickets will be available at the TRU Gym, from varsity basketball players, and by calling 828.5009 or 828.5270.

To an athlete giving his or her best on the field or in the gym, there's nothing like the roar of a cheering crowd of fans. Even silent spectators give athletes a psychological edge just by being in the bleachers wearing their team's colours. WolfPack merchandise is available at bookies and at the gym concession.

Season's tickets are also available, with an all-sport season's pass \$80, and single-sport passes going for \$50. Students may purchase an all-sport pass for only \$30, or a single-sport pass for \$20.

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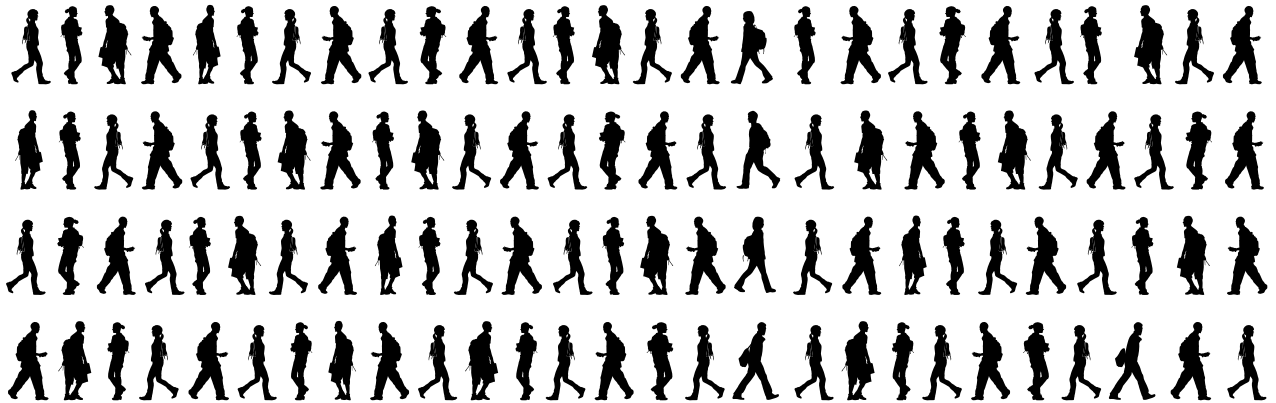


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
